The certificate in Film Studies offers a wide array of interdisciplinary courses aimed at developing skills in close analysis and critical writing, provoking theoretical and methodological reflection, and deepening students' historical knowledge of film and media practices. As befits the interdisciplinary character of our program, we have many rich connections with disciplines such as art history, comparative literature, the various national literatures, languages and cultures, gender studies, cultural studies, history and others.

- Perceive how the study of film can improve writing ability, enhance critical thinking, and encourage a nuanced understanding of the written word;
- Study the historical, cultural, and/or biographical context;
- Understand how films influenced and were influenced by other literature;
- Appreciate the relevance of film to our contemporary society; and
- Gain a basic understanding of filmmaking techniques and technology.
