Henderson State University Minor in Anthropology

The Department of Sociology, Human Services/Social Work and Criminal Justice offers a minor in Anthropology. Students at Henderson State University can learn about the diversity of human cultures, develop critical thinking and data collection skills, and examine the discipline as a possible area of graduate study. Several of these Anthropology courses fulfill HSU's Non-Western Culture core requirement, or may be applied to a minor in Museum Studies, a certificate in Forensics, or the BS in Criminal Justice. In addition, research experience in archeology is available through courses and at HSU's Archeological Research Station and the Caddo Center on campus.

The minor in Anthropology requires 12 hours made up of two introductory courses and two upper-level courses in Anthropology.
